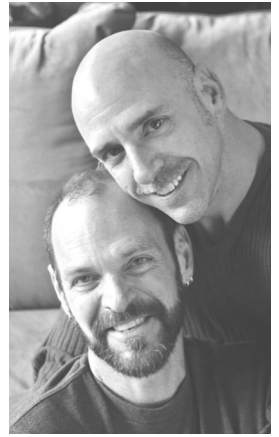

HISTORICAL SOCIETY of POTTAWATTAMIE COUNTY

Pizza Pioneers, Monday, April 6, 6:00 pm. Odds are you remember where you were when you first learned of the Kennedy assassination or that Elvis (or Michael Jackson) had died. We recall our first car and our first love. But do you remember your first pizza? Pizza seems like it's been around forever, but it didn't make it to Council Bluffs until the 1950s and didn't gain real popularity until the late 1960s. Join us as the Historical Society examines this slice of local history in a program at Pizza Counter, 610 Veterans Memorial Highway. Doors open at 5 pm, program at 6. There is no admission charge.

Fairmount Park History Hike, Saturday, April 11, 10 am. What's been considered the crown jewel of the city's park system got its start as a failed and fraudulent real estate venture. Along the way, it's been home to tourist cabins, residential caves, a pair of antenna towers for Council Bluffs' first radio station, a zoo, a carillon that entertained some and annoyed others, a pool, and a crazy, sharp-angled cut through the bluffs that left a streetcar stranded. We'll explore this history in a leisurely one-hour hike for Historical Society members, Saturday, April 11; meet at the picnic area near lookout point (KOIL point) at 10 am. The hike will be conducted by Richard Warner; there is no charge. (HSPC Members Only)

The Beatles and the Bluffs, Monday, May 4, 6:30 pm. John, Paul, George, and Ringo may never have ventured into Council Bluffs, but their influence was very much felt here, and on the music we listen to in the Metro. In this program, Beatles historian Brian Mainwaring will talk about the music of the Beatles and their influence from 1965 on. The program will be at the Council Bluffs Public Library. No admission charge.

Fairview Cemetery History Hike, Thursday, May 7, 5:30 pm. The headstones of Fairview Cemetery tell the names of some of Council Bluffs' earliest residents and provide an interesting window into the past. Meet at the cemetery main entrance for this history hike, conducted by Troy Stolp. The program is cosponsored by the Council Bluffs Public Library; there is no admission charge.

Thanks to everyone who attended our **Saturday Morning Mixer** on February 28!! Great food, great friends, fun playroom for the kiddos, and lots of good information on what's happening in the City with Council Steve Gorman and Mayor Jill Shudak both in attendance. It's important to take these opportunities to help make our neighborhood and our city better places to live, **so make the time to attend!** We hope we'll see YOU at the next gathering!





SPRING HOME MAINTENANCE PROJECTS



EXTERIOR: The checklist starts at the roof and works it's way down to the ground. Focus on wood which is susceptible to wood rot and holes/gaps that might allow water to get behind your home's siding. You'll want to check to see if wood is "spongy or soft to the touch" indicating repairs/replacement is needed.

Roof – check for missing or loose materials. Check around the chimney, skylights and vents for leaks. Look along the eaves for evidence of ice dams.

Check fascia (vertical) & soffits (horizontal) around your roof's edge. Make sure they're tight as they play a role in keeping water from entering your home.

Gutters – clean once a year and twice a year if your home has significant tree coverage. Many houses have different needs on each side of the house, so clean as needed.

Siding & paint – check for cracks, gaps and peeling paint. Repair/replace caulking if you find any gaps. Wood trim often needs more frequent painting as it's there to protect the wood, not just to make your house pretty.

Doors & windows – repair screens, install/swap screens for storm doors/windows. Replace weather stripping as needed.

Window sills and kick boards below exterior doors are the most vulnerable wood rot features, so check them carefully.

Mailboxes, fencing, etc. – repair damage done during snow removal or winter storms.

Deck – clean, repair and stain. Stain wears better than paint and it's easier to maintain because it doesn't peel.

Grill – clean outdoor grill, lawn mower and other tools used outdoors. Check to insure they're working properly before they're needed.

Exterior faucets – turn water on and check faucets for leaks. Be prepared to shut water off quickly as burst pipes are often buried inside house walls.

Foundation plantings (shrubs) surrounding the house need trimming to make sure the wood behind them can dry out.

INTERIOR: Sure you can do indoor home maintenance throughout the year but will you? Once you get this list done, you can enjoy the summer without any guilty feelings. Your most important role is to insure things get done so call your local handyman if you aren't able to do these chores yourself.

Attic – check your insulation for moisture and replace as needed. Be sure to find where the water is coming from and fix that too. You might need more ventilation to get rid of moisture and sometimes it's as simple as rearranging boxes to allow air to circulate.

Bathrooms – check caulking around tubs, showers, sinks and toilets, replacing as needed. Check grout too and repair to prevent water damage or mold.

A/Cs – install window A/Cs so you're ready for the warm weather. Get your HVAC system tuned (duct work too) to insure it's operating efficiently. Change filters too.

Safety – check batteries for smoke and carbon dioxide detectors. Spring is a fun time to hold a family fire drill.

Ceiling fans – clean (lots of dust on top) and check to insure fans are operating properly. Yes, you can use fans year round to save on your energy bill.

Appliances – clean refrigerator coils (older refrigerators only), your stove exhaust hood and dryer vents.

Basement – check walls and floor for dampness. If you find any humidity, find out where it's coming and make repairs. Test your sump pump to insure it's functioning properly before spring rain.

Hot Water Heater – once a year, drain and clean out deposits on the bottom. Check the anode rod (find a YouTube video on how to do this) and replace to avoid a mess.

Dehumidifiers – clean periodically and make sure they're working properly.

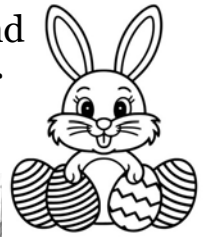

I love nothing more than a good brownie...either from a box, or an old-school recipe, or a “fusion combination” that satisfies that chocolate craving! This **One-Bowl Brownie recipe** is from my hometown, printed in “The Summer Band Parents Cookbook, 1992-1993.” It’s 520 pages of old-time, small-town cherished recipes; it was an honor to have your recipe printed in any edition.

My reading teacher and summer school tutor was the amazing Donis Frisch, and she would often have a treat or snack after summer sessions. This recipe I stumbled across while reading, yes reading, cookbooks. Here is the original - and *some side notes from my adjustments** (anything with “*” is something I added).

ONE BOWL BROWNIES

In one large bowl, cream with hand mixer:

2 cups sugar + 4 eggs + *2 teaspoon real vanilla

Mix in: 6 tablespoon cocoa powder (*or dark chocolate powder, if available)

1—1/2 cup flour

1 cup melted oleo (*1/2 cup butter + 1/2 cup margarine)

3 Tbsp chocolate syrup

*a fat pinch of kosher or sea salt

Fold-in with a spoon:

1 cup of nuts your choice, mixing 1/2 cup in the batter and saving the other 1/2 cup to scatter on top. (*I recommend 1 cup pecans that have been toasted in 2 Tbsp butter in a skillet over low heat)

Spread the batter in the pan evenly, and bake at 350° until done, or when a tooth pick test in the center is to your liking. I like my brownies under baked, a bit fudge-like texture in the center, with crispy edges.

The top will have a crisp crust.

- In a 9x13 cake pan, approx. 25-35 min
- In a 7x11 casserole dish, approx. 35-45 min
- In a 8x8 glass dish, approx. 45-50 min

Enjoy.... with a glass of milk or bowl of ice cream!

GNA HOMES: 301 Worth Street, The Keessee House

On April 6, 1854, congress passed an act to enable the citizens of Council Bluffs to acquire titles to their claims. Judge Franklin Street (yes, Frank Street) was authorized to execute deeds to bona fide claimants. Judge Street hired Thomas Tostevin to survey the claims and plat the lines. Land was bought and sold, and often passed through several owners before a house would be built.

And so it was with the property at the corner of Third and Worth Streets. One of the owners was J. M. Palmer who came here from Ohio and engaged in real estate, built a three-story block and a public hall, and was a banker for a time but failed in the crash of 1857.



T.H. (Thankful Hannah) Keessee House, built 1870

He was mayor four times between 1862 and 1870. (Frank Street was mayor in 1867 and Thomas Tostevin in 1868.)

The house appears to have been built around 1870 for T. H. (Thankful Hannah) Keessee. The family of Robert Reed, heir of T. H. Keessee, lived here for a number of years.

Features of this two-story Italianate house include a hipped roof with an eave overhang, segmental-arched windows that now have replacement windows, a front door transom, and a widow's walk balustrade on the roof. The original porch was removed but its outline can be seen on the side of the house.

Third Street was known as the "Street of Generals" because four men who attained the rank of general lived within a three-block area: Generals George and Frank Everest (brothers) at 125 Third Street, Dr. Mathew Tinley at 520 Third Street (sadly, his house was demolished in 2011), and General Grenville M. Dodge at 605 Third Street.

The Willow/Bluff/Third Street District was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2005.
